

FEMALE ENTREPRENEUR AWARDS 2016

KZN MEC for Agriculture and Rural Development, Mr Themba Mthembu drew lessons from history to show how women's role in agriculture can be enhanced.

MEC Mthembu said that the Women's anti-pass March 60 years ago was not just an event but a process. Similarly, the Female Entrepreneur Awards was a process aimed at recognising and empowering women farmers.

According to MEC Mthembu, what is often left out of the story is how this march came about. He said the process started two years before in 1954 when trade unionist, Ray Simons, began speaking to other women about forming a women's organization. They started organizing and by 17th April that year, one hundred and forty six delegates, representing 230 000 women from all over South Africa attended a conference and pledged their support for programmes of the ANC and the Congress Alliance. They formed the Federation of South African Women, known as Fedsaw. The organization agreed that their main task was to work towards the liberation of the country, but they said this would not be achieved without the full participation of women.

He said members of FEDSAW went out into the rural areas and all over South Africa educating other women in the struggle for freedom and how the Pass laws were restricting their lives. This resulted in 20 000 women arriving in Pretoria two years later to march to the Union Buildings. "It is clear that events don't just happen, there is a lot of organization and hard work behind the scenes as well as months, even years of preparation," MEC Mthembu added.

He said a valuable lesson from FEDSAW was that if you want to make gains in life, you have to get organized and not only help yourself, but other women as well.

According to the MEC, the march did not just end but culminated in women going back and organizing in their communities. "This is what we want to achieve with the Female Entrepreneur's Award. This must be the start of a journey where the Department of Agriculture and Rural Development can offer you after-care and help you to improve your farming skills so that you can move on to greater heights in your farming enterprises and help empower other women as well," he said

MEC Mthembu said this was in line with what Government wanted to achieve - radical economic transformation and improved service delivery with special emphasis on women. He said he would welcome suggestions, ideas and any opinions on how the female entrepreneur awards can be improved as a vehicle of empowerment.

MEC thanked the officials in KZN DARD and partners from the agriculture sector who ensured that the process of choosing the winners was rigorous and fair. "This is not the end, but must be the start of our own commitment as a Department to ensuring

that women empowerment remains a key aspect of our service delivery agenda," MEC Mthembu said.
